Course Description

An introduction to the authorship and contents of the Old Testament books. Special attention will be given to important persons, places and events, as well as to key chapters in the Old Testament revelation.

Rationale

A student of God's Word must consider the value of the Old Testament for his or her life. Not only is the Old Testament the history of the Jewish people, but it also holds God's earliest teachings of sin, repentance, and justification. This course identifies the points of importance for a more complete, historical, and contextual understanding of God's revelation to man.

Reading and Study

The student will complete the assigned reading from the Bible and course textbooks and will view the videos for each module. (CLO's: 1–4)

Discussions (4)

Discussions are collaborative learning experiences. Therefore, the student will create a thread in response to the provided prompt for each discussion. Each thread must be at least 250 words and demonstrate course-related knowledge. In addition to the thread, the student is required to reply to at least 3 other classmates' threads. Each reply must be at least 150 words. The student must support assertions with references from the specified course textbook. (CLOs: 1–4)

Old Testament Bible Study Assignment

The student will complete a Bible study assignment where they will demonstrate correct use of the hermeneutical method in order to properly study and understand a passage from the Old Testament. The student will seek to discover what can be learned from the selected passage when he or she is studying using the technique of observation, interpretation, correlation, and application. Additionally, the student will connect the Bible passage to the redemptive narrative of Scripture. Rather than using the typical research paper format, this Bible study assignment will be completed by using a template that addresses each component of the hermeneutical method. (CLOs: 3 & 4)

Quizzes (8)

Each quiz will cover the Learn material for the Module: Week in which it is assigned. Each quiz will be open-book/open-notes, contain 20–25 multiple-choice, true/false, or short-answer questions. Students will have 1 hour to complete each quiz. (CLOs: 1–4)
